## Can a photographer make me look good in all of my photos?

"A great photographer can see the beauty and the 'best sides' in every subject. However, looking good in each and every photo cannot be a task handled by the photographer alone. You can help them out by using a good hair and make-up artist and having a well-fitting dress that suits your body shape. It's also worth doing a practice session with your photographer. I usually take between 250 and 400 images on a full wedding day. Any more is quantity over quality in my book," Paul Phillips
